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
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From the PASTOR—

Pretty soon there will be a chill in the air......okay I'm not going there – it's too depressing. Instead let's talk about some good things that summer has brought with it again this year. Let's start with our summer music/VBS program. For the third year in a row Shannon Eggers headed up the program. This will be her last year with us and we thank her for what she has done. She has taught a lot of different people a lot of music skills over her time here with us. We will miss her and while we don't know for sure we hope that next year we are able to offer the program again with a different MLC music student taking over the reins or should I say the baton. We wish Shannon God's richest blessings as she finishes up her schooling and looks forward to serving God full time as a teacher in one of our schools.

If you read last month's comments about this program, and I'm sure you did, you saw that we have over 35 people taking lessons that are NOT members of our church. While we don't know that anyone is going to join our church because of this, we do know that they have been exposed to what our church and school can offer them. Only the Holy Spirit knows if a spark has been ignited in a heart that might someday be fanned into a full-fledged flourishing faith. VBS

As was mentioned in the previous article one of the duties of our music teacher was also heading up our Vacation Bible School program. This year we had about 55 (give or take depending on the day) students "Dive In" and get immersed in God's Word. A number of our members both young and old volunteered to teach, help with crafts, bring and/or serve snacks and do anything else that was needed so that our program could be successful. We could not do it without these people and that is why we offer you our heartfelt thanks. The theme for this year was DIVE IN! Five unusual ocean creatures led us into God's Word. Take a peek at a summary of each day.

- Day 1: Black Dragonfish Just as the black dragonfish uses a glowing light to trick smaller fish to come near its mouth, so the devil tries to trick us to follow him instead of God. Our lesson was from Genesis 3: "God Promises a Savior From Sin."
- Day 2: Porcupine Fish As a porcupine fish fills up with water, its body gets fat and its sharp spines stick out. Enemy fish stay away! We fill up on God's Word so we can use it to fight our enemy the devil and win. Our lesson was from Matthew 4:1-11: "Jesus Says No to the Devil."
- Day 3: Sand Dollar People have written stories about the pictures on sand dollars. But God wrote the best story of all, and it is true. He wrote it in the Bible. It tells how he sent his Son, Jesus, to live on earth , die on a cross, and come back to life to forgive our sins and give us life in heaven. Our lesson was from portions of the Gospels: "The Savior Dies and Comes Back to Life."
- Day 4: Sea Anemone The sea anemone lets certain fish hide among its many arms (tentacles). The one who loves and protects us is God! Our lesson was from portions of Exodus 14-17: "God Protects His People."
- Day 5: Dolphin Did you know that dolphins sometimes help people *by accident?* Jesus wants us to help people *on purpose* to show that we love him for saving us. Our lesson was from 1 Samuel 18:1-12;19:1-7: "Jonathan Serves God by Helping David."

TREE OF LIFE

A couple of yea's ago one of the trees on the Third street side of church was almost completely toppled in a storm. It is very evident that it and a few others are diseased and decaying. We had some tree experts take a look at them and the recommendation was to take out the first two trees closest to Marshall Street and trim up all the others. The council and voters have decided that this is the best thing to do so that we don't

have possible serious damage to the church or the rental on Third or injury to people or damage to cars etc. No one likes to see big old beautiful trees come down but all things considered it is the best thing to do. So very soon the landscape on that side of the church will change – at least for a time. That is where the TREE OF LIFE comes in.



Plans would be to plant a new tree where the old trees were taken out. I guess we could buy a \$100 "stick" to put there and wait 25 years for it to grow to a nice size or maybe we could purchase a more developed tree to plant there? The Tree of Life idea would be that anyone who would like to make a donation as a memorial in memory of a loved one or in honor of an event like a new grandbaby or wedding anniversary can do so over the next two months. Pastors Report: Pioneers may go camping this fall. CLYF will be going to Valley Fair this summer. The Hamilton Funeral Home seminar is scheduled for Tues July 26th at church. The copier at church needs replacing. Maintenance has been out. Proposal for a desktop copier from Marco is \$350 +\$.023 per copy over 1000/yr. Motion by Mark Patzer, second by Tom Werner "to purchase a copier from Marco for \$350 + \$.023 per copy over 1000/year" Motion passed. Pastor will ask the Sunday School group to consider putting funds towards it. Bats have been found at church, maintenance will seal up the chimney in the basement in an attempt to keep them out. Pastors knee surgery is scheduled for Monday June 20, 2016.

Elders Report: In by Affirmation: Amy Magnuson and adult child Annie Magnuson, motion from board second Dan Herrmann, approved. In by affirmation: Jordan Austin, motion from board second Brian Onken, approved. Post card campaign is continuing.

Financial Secretary: Written report was handed out.

Treasurer's report: \$2234 was taken from the building fund to pay for the church attic insulation project. Mission offerings are

up \$1600 from 2015 to \$7618 as of June 12. Gym rentals are up \$720 ytd vs ly. Non-budgeted misc. expense includes \$375 from the WLFCS payment. ECC ytd is \$683.19 in the black. Written report is available.

Stewardship: The Capital Project Wish List in now updated and will be published in the newsletter for the congregation to see. The archiving of church records project is underway.

Evangelism: Pie social was well attended by new members as well as the congregation. Group is working on SOS parade ideas.

Education Report: The board is meeting with faculty this summer to discuss the school's image and policies. Since the call for a director/teacher was returned, the board is looking at help for Mrs Zander. Lower level bathroom project is in the planning/bid process. C&C Cleaning has started and the board is pleased. C&C says that they will not need the mop sink we have been considering. Summer music/VBS has 30+ non-members involved. Funding for the program has been a bit slow coming in this year. Mrs Macarthur is undergoing a continuing education program this summer. School registration is August 11th.

Maintenance: Several bids have come in for the tree trimming/tree removal at church. Brian's tree service bid \$2089 to remove 4 big trees, trim the rest at \$340 each. TSL bid \$450 to trim all 5 trees and remove the 13' stump. Scott's tree service bid \$1350 to remove 2 trees, and trim two others. Motion by Dan Herrmann second by Lyle to have Scotts Tree Service cut down 2 trees and trim the rest for \$1350" motion carried. The Village Drive furnace/AC has been serviced and is running well. July 29th has been set to scrape the ceiling in the dishwasher area at school and repaint. The maintenance committee will get a bid to scrape the parking lot at school. The outside ramp at school needs some attention, it is sagging.

Activities: The service in the park will be the last Sunday in July

BOARD OF EDUCATION

<u>Attendees:</u> Craig Heil, Pastor Schreiner, Charlie Hoflock, Darik Lyons, Mr. John Festerling, Nick Noble, Gary St Aubin, and Dave Biastock.

Pastor opened the meeting with prayer.

<u>Samuel Image Discussion:</u> Gary St Aubin was welcomed to the meeting. As chairman of the church council, he felt it would be beneficial for him to sit in on the school image discussion to gain a better understanding of the issues. Craig opened the discussion indicating Craig, Pastor, and Mr. Festerling held a prior meeting regarding the image of our school. Craig summarized the discussion that had taken place to get everyone up to speed. Pastor laid out some scenarios and background of some things that had been brought to his attention and things that he has observed but spoke of concerns in more general terms. Next open comments and concerns were expressed by members of the board.

Action items: Craig will put together an end of the year school survey that in general asks what went well last year and what could we improve upon. In order to keep the survey anonymous we will utilize Survey Monkey. Craig will email the questions to the group for approval prior to sending to Linda to setup the survey and sending it out to parents of children who attended Samuel this past school year. Once survey results have been received, a meeting will be held with all teachers to discuss results of the survey along with concerns raised in tonight's meeting. Revisit our existing school disciplinary policy and research other school's policies. Opportunity areas: Free time/down time for faculty. How do we build better rapport so others are not afraid to speak up. Work together with faculty to flush out policy and better ways to handle discipline. Suggestion box. General Positive Attitude. Pastor support of teachers

After the conclusion of the school imagine discussion, Gary excused himself from the meeting. Minutes were reviewed from the May 3rd meeting and approved with corrections. Minutes approved by Nick and seconded by Darik.

Financial – **Treasurer Reports:** Darik reviewed financial activities for May along with current account balances. There are 2 families with outstanding tuition balances, 3 families with outstanding EC balances, and a couple families with outstanding lunch balances. Mr. Festerling will continue to follow up with the

families.

Old Business: Early childhood

Director/teacher plan B – since we did not receive a called teacher from MLC, do we proceed with Plan B? Mr. Festerling will speak with a potential candidate to see if they have interest, what their commitment would be in obtaining their teaching certificate through MLC along with EC directorship classes, and what their pay and benefit requirements would be. Worker challenges – someone who has helped in prior summers has decided to not work for us this summer. Mrs. Zander is working on finding additional help. Mr. Festerling will work with Mrs. Zander to review the policy of how we bill someone during the school year when their child leaves early on a given day. Lower level bathrooms remodel – waiting on additional bids from contractors.

<u>Lunch Report:</u> New warmers cost about \$180. Money to purchase will come out of the lunch program budget. We are due for our onsite school lunch review this year. Mr. Festerling and Darik will start working on pulling the necessary information together. Paint dishwasher room walls and ceiling - this should be addressed prior to the school lunch review. Tentative work date set for July 29th.

Pastor/Teacher Reports:

CLYF – our youth group along with Lake Benton's youth group will be going to Valley Fair on June 28th. The group will be attending a Willmar Stinger's baseball game in August.

Mrs. MacArthur would like to attend a few classes through the SW Service Coop. Cost is \$115 for 4 sessions. In addition she would like to take an online course for \$39. The board gave its approval to attend these classes and use money in the budget allocated for these types of enrichment classes.

Gym floor will be refinished starting June 20th.

New custodians off to a great start.

From the Board:

Several maintenance items in the bathrooms need to be addressed along with door knob/lock on the janitor closet door in the lower level. Mr. Festerling will pass these items onto the Maintenance Committee.
