"And Mary said: 'My soul praises the Lord and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior" Luke 1:46-47.

The Pioneers met on Sunday, November 13, 2016 at Samuel Lutheran School. A total of 19 Pioneers were in attendance. The Pioneers each selected a metal \(\beta \) ornament and chose from one of three paint colors for painting the ornaments. Between coats of paint, time was spent in the gym playing basketball and other games. Even with the unseasonably warm weather outside, hot apple cider was enjoyed. The painted ornaments will be on display at church during the month of December. The Pioneers will meet again on January 8, 2017.

PUBLIC SCHOOL CONFIRMATION CLASS

Parents please remember that during the season of Advent, when we have midweek services, our Public School Confirmation Class is held from 5:00-6:15 PM on Wednesday evening AT CHURCH. I know that it is not always easy getting your child there at that time but please remember how important this class is for their spiritual growth.

ADVENT SEASON

The Advent Wreath, which originated after the Reformation, is probably the most common used fixture for the season. Four Advent candles are used in an Advent wreath to mark the four weeks before Christmas. One additional candle is lit each week of the Advent season. The lighting of the candles symbolizes the coming of Christ, when the light of prophecy concerning the Messiah became



brighter and brighter until he himself appeared. Originally four white candles were used, but now most churches, including ours, use either blue or purple to match the paraments. One pink, or rose-colored, candle is used and lighted the third Sunday in Advent. Our Advent wreath also has a single white candle in the middle of the wreath called the Christ candle. We pray that this wreath and all other church signs and symbols help focus our attention on the object of our worship – Jesus Christ, God's Son our Savior.

Our midweek Advent services will be on Wednesday evenings at 7:00 PM. The dates are November 30 and December 7, and 14. We hope you will take time and let God prepare your hearts to receive the Christ child during this most blessed season. This year there will be a meal served in the church basement before each of these services. The meal will run from 5:30 – 6:30.

Then a reminder of all the Christmas services taking place at your church. We start with the children's service on Christmas Eve held out to Samuel starting at 5:30 PM. A favorite of many is the traditional Christmas Eve Candlelight service held at church at **9:00 PM**. There is something special about holding a candle (symbolizing the Christ child as the light of the world) and singing "Silent Night" with the lights of the church dimmed. If you have not experienced this before you might want to consider doing so.

NEW BIBLE STUDY

It's not too late to join us for our new Bible study from the book of First Corinthians. We will see in this book many of the problems of the church in Paul's day still plague the church today. But now as then God preserves his faithful people with Word and Sacrament. Why not spend a little extra time mining the treasures of God's Word!

This contemplative service always has special music and joy as we welcome the light of the world into our hearts and lives with candles illuminating the way.

Since last year was such a wonderful success Pastor and Jennifer are once again going to be setting up a "fun night" for all Christ Lutheran children and our area WELS churches in **grades 5-8** on Thursday, December 29th from 6-9PM.
