

From the PASTOR-

The Fifth Petition: Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us.

We continue our study of the Lord's Prayer digging deeper into this gem. May God continue to bless our study of this prayer that Jesus' himself taught us to pray.

How can it be that I still have trespasses that need to be forgiven? After all, any possible excuse for my sins disappears when you have answered the first four petitions of this prayer. You give me daily bread so that I may have

the energy to hallow your name. By your promise, yes by your rich answer to that prayer you have freed me from fear of tomorrow; therefore I have no excuse for greed and selfishness which I might think I have, were I left alone in this world to provide by myself for myself. And then so you bring me your kingdom in the gospel of forgiveness so that I have no excuse for the sin of doubting your love and fearing your wrath.

Father, grant me the grace to treasure all the more the gift of forgiveness that I both receive and give in church every Sunday. For there I confess with all my brothers and sisters in Christ that I have sinned. And there your called servant forgives me in your name. And there I say "Amen" as he forgives also those around me who have made the same confession. And so you forgive us our trespasses even as we forgive one another. So Father, forgive perfectly as we forgive in your name that your gracious rule may be established and grow in our hearts and lives.

THE IMPOSITION OF ASHES ON ASH WEDNESDAY

Part of our preparation for the season of Lent includes our celebration of the imposition of ashes on Ash Wednesday. For those who are new to our congregation I am reprinting the reasons behind and also our procedure for this ancient custom.

Custom:

Ash Wednesday derives its name from a custom of the imposition of ashes that reflects the theme of Lent - repentance. Lent is not Holy Week but a preparation for Holy Week. We prepare first with a sober evaluation of ourselves in the light of God's Law. This attitude of repentance and the sense of mortality produced by the Law (we are sinners who will die!) was invariably connected with ashes, as in the Messianic 102nd Psalm, "For I eat ashes as my food and mingle my drink with tears." Jesus referred to this practice of wearing ashes as an indication of what was in the heart, "Woe to you, Korazin! Woe to you, Bethsaida! If the miracles that were performed in you had been performed in Tyre and Sidon, they would have repented long ago in sackcloth and ashes" (Matthew 11:21). Ashes are also a symbol of our mortality, more than a symbol - a future reality for all of us, "Dust you are and to dust you will return" (Genesis 3:19). Abraham, the man of faith, understood this. "I am nothing but dust and ashes." he proclaimed to God (Genesis 18:27). The custom of sprinkling earth or dust or ashes over a casket before burial reflects this truth. The first of Dr. Martin Luther's 95 Theses reads, "When our Lord and Master Jesus Christ said, 'Repent!' (Matthew 4:17), he willed the entire life of believers to be one of repentance." A penitent heart is a humble heart, a penitent heart is one aware of its own mortality. Prepared with a penitent and humble heart we are ready to hear the glorious good news that "with Christ there is forgiveness of sins, and where there is forgiveness of sins there is also life and salvation" (Small Catechism). The austere Ash Wednesday Service reflects the character of the penitent heart! The ancient and Lutheran practice of the imposition of ashes contributed to this reflection. Unfortunately, it has fallen into disuse in many of our "Lutheran" churches. But through this day and season of repentance, we are once again directed to Christ, in whom alone

there is life, and of whom Job sang, "I know that my Redeemer lives, and that in the end he will stand upon the earth. And after my skin has been destroyed, yet in my flesh I will see God; I myself will see him with my own eyes - I and not another. How my heart yearns within me" (Job 19:25-27).

Procedure:

We offer this ancient and traditional rite for those who wish to participate. Please keep in mind that you are not required to take part in this aspect of the service if you do not wish to! It is only for those who, at present, feel comfortable with the practice. Early on in the service the ushers will direct those who desire to receive ashes to come forward and stand before the Altar, where the minister will apply ashes to the forehead of each person with the words: Remember that you are dust, and to dust you will return! Members will approach the Altar and return like we do for Holy Communion. Unlike the Lord's Supper children are also invited to come forward, at their parent's discretion, and participate. As with anything we do in worship we do it to the glory of God and to edify God's people. We pray that that is what will happen. If you have any questions please feel free to contact Pastor and he will be happy to speak to you about this matter.

Rotation:

Again this year we at Christ will have a pulpit exchange with St. Peter's of Balaton and St. John's/Peace of Vesta/Echo. Take time – make time to sit at your Savior's feet and listen to him as he tells you and shows you how much he loves you.

"IRONIES OF THE PASSION"

Irony is not a word that most people would ascribe to Jesus' passion. However, certain events in the gospel accounts - Caiaphas' unintentional prophesy, the Jewish leaders' hypocrisy, and others—are actually quite ironic. "Ironies of the Passion" is the theme for our mid-week Lenten series this year. The ironies of the passion will teach us about the unique and lasting significance of Jesus' ministry, death, and resurrection. What better way can we spend our time, this Lenten season, than gathering together for worship? These special services begin at 7:00PM.

Pastor opened with devotion and prayer. Minutes from the November 8, 2015 board meeting were read and accepted.

Pastor's Report:

Pioneers no report. CLYF winter and summer activities are being looked at with area WELS churches. WELS Youth Rally is in Tennessee next year. The cost would be \$300 plus transportation. Waste Management prices are \$49 for 1 pickup a month and \$69 for 2 pickups a month. Drop off fee for new

dumpster is \$150. We are checking with Southwest Sanitation on their prices before we have the dumpster at the school replaced. Research is being done on painting the inside of the church with a decorative gold leaf design. The rack for the chairs at the school has arrived. We have heard many positive comments about the new chairs at church. Christmas candy sacks will be filled on 12/19 at 9 a.m. Will be filling 120 bags this year instead of 150. The Scholarship fund has \$706 in it as of 11/30/15. A motion by Kevin seconded by Tom W to distribute two thirds to Zach Thooft who is attending MLC and the remaining one third to be distributed equally between Walker Schultz, Carlie Heil,

The Christmas service will be on the radio the same time as last year, 11 a.m. to Noon on Christmas day.

Kristina Hagberg who are attending GPLHS. **Motion Passed.**

Jesus Cares Ministries Christmas service will be at 6:30 p.m. on 12/17. Installation of newly elected council and Board of Ed members will be on 12/20 at either service. Annual meeting will be Sunday, January 17, 2016 at 7 p.m. Reports need to be submitted to Linda by January 8th. Pastor will have the yearend reports from all Church organizations that have a bank account for the January council meeting. Middle school (grades 5-8) will have a fun night on Monday December 28th from 6-9 p.m. My Son, My Savior movie night had 30 people attending. Treasurer:

The parking lot payment and chair funds are in the Building Improvement fund. The mutual fund balance as of November 30th

is \$138,762. Budgeted offerings are down \$20,000 compared to last year. Early Childhood Center had \$116,191 in income with \$103,061 through November. Year to date net income is \$13,129. A copy of the final voter approved budget was handed out.

Stewardship/Endowment:

Endowment committee brought a motion to approve a written yearend report of committee organization, activities and spending of earnings. Seconded by Craig. **Motion Passed**. Offerings designated to Synod are behind last year.

Evangelism:

Served first advent service. There were 40 children at the Christmas for kid's event.

Education:

The Board of Ed continues their study of qualification and guidelines for the ECC staff. Playground bench has been installed. The school staff will be attending two in service days in 2016. Grandparents day will be in January. City hoops group will be using the gym.

Maintenance:

New backboards have been installed in the gym and the holes left from the old brackets need to filled and painted. Tom W is storing the old ones for now. Stool in church basement bathroom has been fixed. A motion to add 12 inches of insulation to church attic at a cost up to \$3,000 using money from the building improvement fund was made by Geoff seconded by Tom G.

Pastor Schreiner opened the meeting with prayer.

Earlier Childhood Center Update:

Mrs. Zander provided the board with an update. There has been no response to ads for the open assistant teacher position. Mrs. Zander will continue looking and getting the word out. One new student started the beginning of November in the 2nd year class. All is going well with Mrs. Ellingson filling in for Mrs. Timm during Mrs. Timm's maternity leave. Mrs. Timm will be returning the second week of January. Current enrollment: 27 in Pre-K and 19 children at various times in the after school program. Job descriptions for the various EC positions were reviewed. Darik revised the wording of the job duties to match closer to how it would be worded by an HR person. Discussion held regarding the best way to fill or get additional help with directorship duties. It was felt we are at a point where we need to explore calling a
