From the PASTOR-

Holy Communion

The Lord Jesus, on the night he was betrayed, took bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, "This is my body, which is for you; do this in remembrance of me." In the same way, after supper he took the cup, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood; do this, whenever you drink it, in remembrance of me." - 1 Corinthians 11:23-25

Often we have a hard time believing that we are loved. Men and women who have a keen awareness of their flaws will wonder if anyone can really love them. So we have a need to not only hear that we are loved, but also to receive tangible assurance of that love.

If we need that assurance from our fellow human beings, how much more do we need that assurance in our relationship to God?

God knows us so well. He knows how we feel. He knows what we need. Not only does he tell us in his Word that he loves us, he also gives us personal assurance of that love.

How does he do that? He does so in what Christians call *Holy Communion* or *The Lord's Supper*. In this special meal Jesus gives us bread that isn't just bread. He tells us, "This is my body." He also gives us wine to drink that isn't just wine. He says, "This is my blood."

Now before anyone gets grossed out, this isn't some kind of weird cannibalism. It's bread and wine that looks, smells, and tastes like bread and wine. Yet, in a way that we can't perceive or comprehend, Jesus tells us that with the bread and wine, his body and blood are really present in this Supper.

Here's why this is such a great gift. You may think, "I know that Jesus forgives all those other people out there, but I'm not really sure that he can forgive me." In Holy Communion, Jesus comes to you personally and says, "I love you. Your sins are all forgiven. You want proof? Here's the price I paid for you on the cross. This is my body which was sacrificed for you. This is my blood which I shed for you."

Whenever we receive the Lord's Supper, we remember Jesus' saving, self-sacrificing love for us, and we personally receive not only assurance of that love, but we also receive his forgiveness.

Just like the father in the story, God our heavenly Father is always waiting for us with open arms. Deb Herrmann called the meeting to order and thanked Pastor for leading us in the Bible study. The Secretary's report from June 8th was read and approved. The Treasurer's report was read and approved with an ending balance of \$510.80.

<u>Correspondence</u> from Calvary Lutheran Academy, California Lutheran High School, and Friends of China was read.

LWMS report: Julie reported on the National Convention that was held in Orlando, Florida this past June. There were 542 registered attendees with 55 of the 60 circuits represented. The Home Mission project, Equipment Fund, received \$39,326.56. The World Mission project, Nepal, received \$39,326.55. The money received by these two mission projects comes from the mite box collections received from the various circuits throughout the year. Worship service offerings at the convention totaled \$26.049.22 and were divided between Cross-Cultural Mission Conference and Training and Repatriation Conferences. The "kids c.a.r.e." program collected \$37,379.45 this past year. This money was sent to Family Ministry for Outreach. "kids c.a.r.e." stands for Care About Reaching Everyone with the Gospel. Children in Sunday Schools and Lutheran Elementary Schools throughout Synod support missions with their offerings. In the past eleven years, this program has raised over \$608,000 for missions in places like Mexico, Russia, Malawi, and many home missions. The LWMS Fall Rally will be held Saturday. October 7th at Lake Benton.

<u>MLC Auxiliary:</u> Jenny reported that the next meeting will be held on Saturday, October 14th at MLC.

There were no reports from CAMM and Altar/Communion. There was no President's report and no Old Business to discuss.

<u>Attendees:</u> Pastor Schreiner, Craig Heil, Miss Kali Gross, Mr. John Festerling, Mike Prahl, and Dave Biastock

Pastor opened the meeting with prayer.

Early Childhood Update: Miss Gross had a few questions regarding pay. Pay is to be based on the role the individual is fulfilling and needs to be record on time cards. Pay rate – Kali will look at synod, New Ulm, and Redwood Falls pay rates for the various positions to ensure we are within guidelines when bringing on new staff. We are full for the fall EC program with 20 children plus one on the waiting list. After school care is also near full capacity.

<u>Minutes:</u> Minutes were reviewed and approved with corrections from the July 11 meeting.

Financial – Treasurer Reports: Financial activities for July along with current account balances were reviewed. \$7.50 supplemental contribution to Synod Commission on Parish Schools will be sent in for the upcoming school year.

<u>Old Business:</u> Before school arrival – in the future better communication and formal motions should be required when we decide to make changes to schedules as some families were not contacted about the change of the start time for before school care to 7:30. Sportsmanship policy – based on the original motion passing by a 3-2 vote and no additional reasons to not overturning this motion, it was decided to revert back to the

original motion and revise the sportsmanship policy in the school handbook based on simple majority. School security/doors – checked with St Johns-Redwood Falls on security measure incorporate in their school. They install a card reader for 1 door at the cost of \$2600 with volunteer labor to install plus \$4,000 for cameras. Mr. Festerling will continue to explore options. Floor waxing – was completed the end of July.

<u>Lunch Report:</u> Need to continue to monitor what is being provided for meals.

Pastor/Teacher Reports: CLYF - the group will be meeting in September to plan out the upcoming year. Pioneers - will be partnering with PTF to gain additional leadership help with monthly events. Laptops - 6 laptops were purchased which will help fulfill the needs of the larger class sizes especially in grades 3-5. Testing program – in progress of getting the program up and running. Work bee painting/cleaning - Mr. Festerling reviewed a list of items that need to be addressed. Fun days - Pastor discussed the idea of holding quarterly fun days and will be discussing with the staff at an upcoming faculty meeting. One idea is to go to a state park where they can do some learning/ science activities, games, and grill for lunch. Also looking at purchasing shirts that students would wear for fun days. Sounds of Summer Parade - planning to hand out bags with goodies/ school info/lip balm in addition to tossing out candy. The bags would be handed to families with children. Balloon Launch planning to launch 45 balloons with an invite to Sunday School on August 20th after church. Freezers – repairs were completed on 2 of them. Hot water heater - will be replaced before school starts. Enrollment for 2017-18 school year – 47 in K-8th and 20 in Pre-K. We lost 6 students in K-8 due to moves out of the area and/or transferring to a different school.

<u>Upcoming Activities:</u> 8/16 – work bee, 9/5 – first day of school, 9/19 – open house at 6:30.

From the Board: Is there a volleyball schedule? Mr. Festerling indicated he had just received it. Parking lot – could we price class 2 or other options besides concrete or blacktop? Craig will talk to Perry Schultz to see if there are other options. Wages – need to ensure we are fair and at least at minimum wage. We will decide if changes are needed based on the information Miss Gross is working on obtaining.

Next meeting – September 7 at 7:00 pm Pastor closed the meeting with prayer.
